The second pillar, **The Obstacles You Overcome**, emphasizes the reality that challenges, rejection, and hardship are inevitable parts of growth. My platform would focus on helping students reframe their understanding of success, encouraging them to see it as more than outward achievements. I would advocate for implementing systems like personalized feedback emails for students who don't receive positions after interviews, offering constructive insights that foster learning and resilience. Through this, I aim to create a campus culture that normalizes struggle as an integral step toward growth.

Finally, **The Time You Take** acknowledges that finding one's place takes time, and that is perfectly okay. My goal would be to host talks, panels, and workshops where individuals share their experiences of navigating uncertainty and eventually finding meaningful work and involvement. By highlighting these stories, I hope to encourage students to embrace their journeys without pressure to have everything figured out right away.

As Miss Auburn, my platform would strive to create a supportive, inclusive environment where every student feels equipped to pursue their passions, navigate challenges, and grow at their own pace. Together, we can build a campus community rooted in authenticity, resilience, and confidence in where students are and what they do during their time at Auburn.
